## From Pastor Kohl

Dear Friends,

Why do we give money to the church? It's one of those questions that often gets answered with traditional responses:

- We give money to help pay the church's bills.
- We give money because the church does good things—teaching children, listening to the struggles of people, taking each person seriously, setting a different way of living in the world, and so on.
- We give money because God expects/demands it of us.

The truth is there are probably many reasons we give money to the church. But for us the basic answer, the most radical, foundational reason for giving money to the church is as a response to the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. We give money as a response to the good news, the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

But have you thought about giving money as an act of worship? In the Old Testament, offerings were burned, done away with. They were not offered for some practical purpose, offerings were given because giving is a good thing for us to do. When we give money as an act of worship, thanks and praise to God replace self-interest and guilt in our lives. Our offerings become a sign of our love and devotion to God by giving away something we value—our money.

Or have you thought about giving money to the church as a way of sharing in God's mission in the world? Through offerings shared God's reign becomes more real. Here's what I mean: the reign of God is about making disciples (helping others to know the goodness of God), taking up our cross and following Jesus (sacrificing for others), forgiving (another act of

giving up our need to be right to build a future with others), worshipping God (see the preceding paragraph), loving others (as those who see each person as having great value), and proclaiming the nearness of God (by practically meeting the needs of people). The offering on Sunday mornings is a sign that we are a part of the kingdom of God.

Or how about this: have you thought of giving money to the church as an act of resistance? The world operates on a power and resource basis. If you have money you feel powerful, you feel secure. (How many people thought if they won Power Ball that they would have no worries in the future? And let's be honest: we all fall prey to that kind of thinking.) It seems that our culture's life and spirit are shaped by the power of money, something Jesus calls *Mammon*. Mammon seeks to enslave us, to cause us to think that it can provide all we need. In other words, money can be an idol. Giving money away is a way of resistance to this spirit of Mammon. Giving money to the church puts us in control of our wealth, not wealth or power controlling us.

God has been good to us, giving us more than the human family has ever had or even thought of having. We can be blessings with our money or it can control us. We all decide that in how we share what we have. Consider your life. Would giving help you grow as a child of God, as a citizen of the kingdom of God, as someone set free in Christ?

Jesus reminds us: *Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.* (Luke 12:34) How we live out this decision is ours on Sundays and every day of our lives.

## FROM PASTOR HARRIS

Dear Friends of Christ,

St. Paul wrote some pretty incredible things. Yes, he wrote some very obtuse things, but he wrote some great things to us as well. Many times Paul's second letter to the Corinthians gets sort of forgotten in the presence of the first letter. The first letter, of course, has the great discourse on love, which is heard at so many weddings. I am thinking of the second letter, the fourth chapter, beginning at the seventh verse.

"But we have this treasure in clay jars, so that it may be made clear that this extraordinary power belongs to God and does not come from us." Treasure in clay jars. This sort of sums up all of humanity, doesn't it? Perhaps not much to look at on the outside. Perhaps fragile, chipped, or easily broken. We can say that is us. At least I can say that is me. Even if we, or I, wonder if the treasure is there, certainly the clay jar analogy is apt. So then this extraordinary power does belong to God, and is certainly not us. But Paul goes on, as he often does.

"We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed; perplexed, but not driven to despair; persecuted, but not forsaken; struck down, but not destroyed." Even though we are afflicted, perplexed, persecuted, and struck down, the good news is we are not crushed, not driven to despair, not forsaken, not destroyed. Certainly being afflicted and perplexed is something I can identify with. But these things do not have the final say in our lives. "For while we live, we are always being given up to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus may be made visible in our mortal flesh." This could almost be depressing, but it is not.

"So death is at work in us, but life in you." One might ask the question, "So is it death at work in us, or is it life?" And of course, the answer is yes...however, life wins. How do we know this? The Scripture continues "...because we know that the one who raised the Lord Jesus will raise us also with Jesus, and will bring us with you into his presence." Quite simply the answer is Jesus' death and resurrection. St. Paul continues to drive it home with a few more words and talks of grace and faith and hope.

The truth is, we don't know what tomorrow brings. We do know this: God is for us. God is with us. And these things are true forever. As a reminder of these things, Jesus has gathered a community around his crucified and risen himself, the church. So we care for one another, encourage one another, bear each other, pray for one another. "...so we do not lose heart. Even though our outer nature is wasting away, our inner nature is being renewed day by day." We are renewed by water, word, bread, and wine. We do the work of Jesus for each other and to each other. We know what the final tomorrow brings. Life with God, even as we have that now.

It has been an honor, and my privilege, to work with you in the ministry that Christ has called us to. I treasure the times that I was able to preach and preside for you. Thank you for letting me be involved in confirmation and Sunday school, and other times of learning and fun. And of course, thank you for the cookies. Know that the people of Pilgrim will always be in my thoughts and prayers.

In the days ahead, I hope to be doing some thinking on things such as confirmation ministries, how technology can be used for the sake of the gospel, and perhaps developing "an online presence". God bless Pilgrim and her mission to the world.

## SUNDAY SCHOOL

## Confirmation 2013-2014

Preparation for the Rite of Affirmation of Baptism (Confirmation) is offered for all students between 7<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> grades. This is a ministry Pilgrim Church does along with St. Paul Church in Warwick and Bethany Church in Cranston. Classes meet on Tuesday evenings from 6:30 until 8:15. Our first meeting is different. It will take place on **Tuesday, September 24** and we will **begin at 7:00 p.m.** We would like all students and a parent/guardian to be at the meeting. The program we have at Pilgrim Church has expectations and involves the families of the students. We would like everybody to understand how this series of classes works.

Over the three years of instruction we cover the Bible, *The Small Catechism* of Martin Luther, and topics or issues that impact on young people's lives. This year our plans include addressing issues our adolescents face. We want our students to know that as the followers of Jesus our lives are shaped by his principles, not simply what everyone else is doing.

Whenever there is a class for the evening (sometimes there are fellowship or service events) we ask a family or a couple of families together to provide a supper for the students.

**Pastor Elizabeth Eaton elected  
ELCA presiding bishop**

The Rev. Elizabeth A. Eaton, bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America Northeastern Ohio Synod, was elected Aug. 14 presiding bishop of the ELCA at the 2013 ELCA Churchwide Assembly. She was elected on the fifth ballot. There were 889 votes cast, and 445 votes were needed for an election. Eaton received 600 votes and the Rev. Mark S. Hanson, ELCA presiding bishop, received 287. Eaton is the ELCA's first woman presiding bishop-elect.

The Assembly met on August 12-17 in Pittsburgh, PA. The theme of the gathering was "Always being made new." This year marks the 25th anniversary of the ELCA.

"We are a church that is overwhelmingly European in a culture that is increasingly pluralistic. We need to welcome the gifts of those who come from different places, that is a conversation we need to have as a church," Eaton told the assembly shortly after the election.

Prior to becoming synod bishop, Eaton served as pastor for ELCA congregations in Ohio. She earned a Master's of divinity degree from Harvard Divinity School in Cambridge, Mass., and a Bachelor's degree in music education from the College of Wooster in Wooster, Ohio.

Bishop-elect Eaton will be installed on October 5, 2013 at Rockefeller Chapel in Chicago.

## REPORT FROM THE AUGUST 2013 CONGREGATION COUNCIL MEETING

A task force generated out of recommendations approved by the congregation from the "Listening Panel" reported to the council on issues of structure and leadership. They made the following recommendations for our life together:

- Begin each council meeting with a short devotion.
- Form a workgroup to review the congregation council retreat outline and other models to establish a committee structure.
- Council members to be encouraged to read books from the *Augsburg Press Leaders Series*.
- The Council's first meeting in February to begin with an orientation for new and old council members.
- Each committee and group to establish goals or major projects for each year.
- The Leadership-Structure Workgroup would like to work with the Nominating Committee to recruit for new council members. Recommend recruitment to start in the fall.

All these proposals were approved.

Financial reports (July 31-2013)

Income for budget \$141,406.40 (includes a transfer from special funds of \$12,856)

Budgeted expenses \$147,257.69

The Care Team is preparing a brochure to help the congregation know the kinds of work they do. A part of this will be asking for other ways to serve. Watch for the brochure. It will be given out on a Sunday morning in September.

## Sunday Readings - September 2013

### September 1 – Pentecost 15C/Lectionary 22

#### Proverbs 25:6–7

This section of the Book of Proverbs gives practical advice on how to think about oneself.

#### Hebrews 13:1–8, 15–16

The Letter to the Hebrews is a catechetical letter, one that tells how to live life as a follower of Jesus. This section has down to earth guidance on many factors in life.

#### Luke 14:1, 7–14

Jesus teaches us that our life is lived in humility and love. As he does so often, here Jesus uses earthly pictures to teach us.

### September 8 – Pentecost 16C/Lectionary 23

#### Deuteronomy 30:15–20

Tradition claims that Deuteronomy is a book of five sermons Moses delivered before the people of God entered the Promised Land. In this reading we hear that there are consequences for our decisions. God's path will always lead to life.

#### Philemon 1:1–21

Paul is not beneath arm-twisting to remind Philemon how to treat a fellow Christian: Philemon's own slave, Onesimus (a word which means *useless* in Greek!). Paul wants Philemon to know that the relationship as a fellow Christian with Onesimus is more important than the relationship of owner and slave.

#### Luke 14:25–33

As Jesus is travelling to Jerusalem in Luke's Gospel, he teaches people about the cost of discipleship. Here Jesus lays out clearly that discipleship comes with commitment and is more important than any other thing in life.

### September 15 – Pentecost 17C/Lectionary 24

#### Exodus 32:7–14

It is God who repents, who changes mind about punishing the people with Moses as they travel through the desert. Moses bargains with God, reminding God that God is the one who started this exodus from Egypt. To destroy the people would cause God to appear not true to God's very being.

#### 1 Timothy 1:12–17

In this letter to a younger pastor, Paul rejoices in gratitude for Jesus and the gift of salvation.

#### Luke 15:1–10

A lost sheep and a lost coin become the images Jesus uses to teach about the mercy and intent of God to include all in salvation.

### September 22 – Pentecost 18C/Lectionary 25

#### Amos 8:4–7

Amos the preacher points out specific ways in which God's people turn away from justice for their own benefits.

#### 1 Timothy 2:1–7

The prayers of Christians are not just for themselves. Prayers are for all people that life might be orderly and peaceful. All this is done in Jesus' name who came to bring peace between God and the human family.

#### Luke 16:1–13

Jesus calls his followers to be shrewd in dealing with earthly things. His message is that we cannot love wealth more than God to be Jesus' followers.

### September 29 – St. Michael and All Angels

#### Daniel 10:10–14; 12:1–3

The creation is not just made up of what we see or experience through our senses. The prophet Daniel writes about God's intervention and protection by Michael, "the great prince".

#### Revelation 12:7–12

The great deceiver is cast out from heaven with his angels. This means struggle for the earth. In this passage the writer of Revelation assures us that there is a place where there will be no struggles and the wrath of Satan will be no more.

#### Luke 10:17–20

Michael and the angels fought against Satan. This conquering of Satan and the forces of evil continues as Jesus' followers make real the reign of God by words and deeds.
