From the Pastor

Dear Friends.

Beginning this month we will spend most of our time for the gospel readings in the Gospel of Matthew. This is the year of Matthew in our three-year cycle of readings called the Revised Common Lectionary.

Did you realize that we Lutherans are not the only ones reading the same parts of scripture on Sundays? People in the Episcopal Church, the United Church of Christ, the Roman Catholic Church, the Moravian Church, the Methodist Church and the Presbyterian Church all read the same lessons we do. With such a broad range of Christians hearing the same scripture, we are bound closer to people in other traditions within Christianity than we might think. This is a good reminder that we have more in common than what separates us as followers of Jesus.

While the Gospel of Matthew comes first in the New Testament, it is not the first of the four gospels in our Bible written. That place goes to Mark. We know this because almost all of Mark's writing appears in Matthew's Gospel. In addition to Mark as a source for his gospel, Matthew also uses a collection of sayings by Jesus. Luke also shares most of these. This group of sayings has a name which sounds like it belongs in a James Bond novel: "Q", which stands for the German word Quelle which means simply a "source".

Matthew draws heavily on the Hebrew Scriptures to teach about Jesus. He will show us Jesus as a new Moses with his sermon on the mount. He will show us Jesus as the new Israel with his exile to Egypt. There will be five major teaching sections in Matthew's Gospel, just as the Book of Deuteronomy is made up of five "sermons" which tradition tells us were delivered by Moses before the people came into the promised land. Matthew will write several times that this happened to fulfill "what the prophet...said."

Matthew is one of the two gospels which have stories about Jesus' birth (Luke is the other). In Matthew, the stories center on Joseph rather than Mary. It will be Luke who will tell us the Christmas story including shepherds and a baby in the manger.

Each of our Gospels and all the writings in the New Testament have a political edge to them. As we read Matthew, you may notice that Matthew never uses the words "Kingdom of God". Instead, Matthew refers to Jesus' work and mission as the "Kingdom of Heaven". The Kingdom of Heaven is not a place but it is a lifestyle that stands against the kingdom of this world. The church in Matthew is a community whose life and focus is shaped more by the future than by the past. In fact, Matthew's entire gospel is written with one eye on the past and another eye on the future. Jesus is the hinge on which these two orientations work: he comes from a traditional Jewish background, but brings a new understanding of what God has promised and is up to.

We read Scripture to get a glimpse of God's goals in our world. In faithfully spending time with the Bible our lives change and we grow into being more and more the people of God. As we gather in this year of Matthew we will be shaped by the Holy Spirit to be this community whose life is defined, not by our past but by the future God has in mind. And we come to know this future as we listen to and follow the one Matthew calls "Emmanuel" which means "God is with us". That's a promise we can trust because it has been made real for us in the flesh and blood of Jesus, bread and wine and water, and others who gather with us to listen to Jesus.

The Prayers of the People

For several months, the Prayers of the People offered at worship have been prepared by people of Pilgrim. Perhaps you have noticed that the petitions are more current to the needs of prayer for the Pilgrim community and its reach into the town and the world beyond. People have been preparing the prayers since we began responding to the petitions by singing, "Lord, listen to your children praying," or "O Lord, hear my prayer,"

The prayers are published in "Sundays and Seasons". It is suggested that they may "be adapted or used as appropriate." The Committee of Worship, Music and Arts is inviting the people of Pilgrim to adapt them for Sunday worship and special occasions. Those who prepare the prayers are also invited to pray them during the worship services, in the place of the assisting minister at the lectern, using the microphone.

This is how it works: a copy of the petitions is provided for a particular date several weeks in advance and returned to Pastor Kohl on the Thursday before Sunday so that he may include additional prayers of immediate need. It is convenient to participate in rewriting and adapting the Prayers of the People by signing up for a date on the "Prayers of the People" sheet posted on the worship bulletin board. Music Ministry at Pilgrim Church

The Church Council has approved a recommendation from the Worship, Music and the Arts committee to purchase a Yamaha digital piano (CVP-609) for the sanctuary. The approval was given with the understanding that the total cost of the piano (\$8,000) would have to be raised through donations and fund raising events. I hope that the following information will be helpful as we continue our "walk by faith" at Pilgrim Church.

When considering such a purchase, \$8,000 may seem to be too costly for such an instrument. However, that price is significantly lower than the retail price (\$15,000) because of the trade-in of our Hyundai piano and a long-time friend of mine who happens to be the Yamaha dealer. This is an exceptional offer.

The benefits of including the Yamaha CVP-609 in the worship life of Pilgrim Church are numerous. Here are just a few that we should consider:

- 88 -key Natural Wood keyboard
- Real Grand Piano Expression
- Grand Piano Damper Pedal Control
- 566 Accompaniment Styles (can be used with contemporary worship songs, solos, choir anthem accompaniments, etc.)
- Over 1,000 keyboard, orchestral and percussion digital sounds.
- No Tuning Is Necessary The CVP-609 is not affected by climate change.
- A Compact Digital Grand Piano the sound of a grand piano requiring much less space – a major benefit for our liturgical celebrations.

Pilgrim Church is facing a \$25,000 budget deficit. Certainly, eliminating the deficit is of prime importance. However, I would like to share a suggestion regarding fund-raising for the digital grand piano. The piano has 88 keys. If each key were purchased with a \$100 donation we would raise \$8,800. We already have raised close to \$2,000. Each piano key can now be purchased for just over \$68! Maybe we could look at our deficit in a similar manner. We might surprise ourselves at Christmas - no deficit under the tree!!

Sunday Readings - December 2013

This month we begin church year A in which we will read from the Gospel of Matthew

December 1 - First Sunday of Advent

Isaiah 2:1-5

The prophet looks to the day when people will gather to be with God, to learn God's ways, and to bring about a time of peace.

Romans 13:11-14

Paul writes to the Romans concerning life as Jesus' people. Here he lists characteristics of those who belong to Christ.

Matthew 24:36-44

"Be ready" is the theme of this reading. The day of the Son of Man will come unexpectedly. No one knows when that will be except God.

December 8 - Second Sunday of Advent

Isaiah 11:1-10

The age of peace is promised when the one who comes from Jesse's lineage will be ruler over God's people. We live in that age now, contrary to our experiences in the world. The peace we have is with God through Jesus.

Romans 15:4-13

"Welcome one another...as Christ welcomed you." With these words Paul; sets forth his picture of the church as a community of hospitality. In such welcome of others, Paul says, we are taking part in the plan of God.

Matthew 3:1-12

John the baptizer is not an easy guy to like. He lives alone; he eats weird food and wears funny clothing, and calls people to be responsible for their actions.

December 15 - Third Sunday of Advent

Isaiah 35:1-10

The prophet's vision resembles the road from slavery in Egypt to the promised land. This vision is filled with promises of God's action to redeem.

James 5:7-10

It's hard to wait, but the writer of James calls us to be patient, just as farmers wait for the crop to be ripe. In our waiting, we are reminded not to grumble about others.

Matthew 11:2-11

In prison, John the baptizer has questions about Jesus. Jesus also teaches his followers that John is the one who comes before God's anointed, greater than a prophet, but least in the kingdom of heaven.

December 22 - Fourth Sunday of Advent

Isaiah 7:10-16

God wants to give Ahaz the king a sign of peace that will come as the military threat fades away. Ahaz refuses to ask for a sign, so God decides to give the sign of peace in a child born who will be God's gift and presence among the people.

Romans 1:1-7

The beginning of the letter to the Romans sets the themes for the letter: the story of who Jesus is and what his life means for his followers.

Matthew 1:18-25

In Matthew's gospel, we read more about Joseph than about Mary in these birth narratives. Joseph's obedience to God's message sets him apart as a righteous and kind man.

December 29 - First Sunday of Christmas

Isaiah 63:7-9

As the church looks back on the Incarnation of God, we read from Isaiah that it is the presence of God, not a messenger, who brings us salvation. This is the truth of the Incarnation: in Jesus we know God with us.

Hebrews 2:10-18

The writer of the Letter to the Hebrews understands the fullness of Jesus' humanity as he shares our life. As the writer speaks about suffering, the writer also speaks about redemption, the reason God came into the world in Jesus.

Matthew 2:13-23

The story of Jesus' humanity continues in this section of Matthew's gospel. Here an angel warns Joseph about the impending disaster of Herod seeking to kill the newborn child. Joseph packs up his family and leaves the country. Jesus and his family become refugees in Egypt. All this is part of the struggle which Jesus came to reveal as a way in which God is at work in our world.
