From the Pastor

Dear Fellow Pilgrims,

During the month of February the church spends its time in the season of Epiphany. This season begins with hearing the story of the three magi who came to worship the infant Jesus and the baptism of our Lord, and concludes with the story of the transfiguration of Jesus on the mountaintop. In between those stories there can be as many as eight Sundays. On each Sunday we consider how Jesus was revealed to people or how Jesus' ministry was shaped by who he is: the Son of God. Epiphany is about coming to understand the work Jesus does for the human family.

I suspect another way we can consider Epiphany is with the theme of surprises. Each of the stories we read has a surprise in it: the king is found in a barn, the heavens open and Jesus is declared God's beloved one, people leave their lives behind and start on a new road, the mountaintop glows with uncreated light and Moses and Elijah are seen talking with Jesus. None of this is just everyday stuff. Epiphany is loaded with surprises.

That's important for us to remember because God is still a God of surprises. God shows us in the least likely places the world would expect to find God: in human words spoken in forgiveness and hope, in water and bread and wine, in a community dedicated to seeing life a new way, on a cross outside of Jerusalem, and in an upper room behind locked doors with terrified disciples.

Epiphany is a time for each of us to consider those places where God has shown up in our lives. A tradition among the Moravian Christians is to write down those places where God has surprised us, those moments of grace when we knew God was there.

But here is the surprising part of doing this: you cannot know where God will meet you in a new or profound way until after the event happens. It is more by looking back that we see where God was than we can predict where God will be in such a lively and astonishing way.

A story is recorded in Exodus 34 in which Moses asks to see God's glory. God agrees but tells Moses he cannot see God's face. So God hides Moses in a cleft in the mountain and covers Moses with God's hand; then God removes the hand and Moses sees God's back. God says to Moses, "You shall see my back, but my face shall not be seen."

Take some time during this month of snow, cold, or spring-like weather to consider those moments of grace in your life: times you were grateful, times you found relief, times you felt refreshed, time when hope came again. Write them down; they are a part of your spiritual autobiography. In doing this you will know that God is closer than you thought and more involved in your life then you might have thought.

The other thing you will learn is that our God is still in the surprising business, because God is in the business of blessings.

Stewardship Thoughts

Drivers in Rhode Island often think of the speed limit as the bottom line for how fast they should drive. Let's face it: we all find ourselves over the limit sometimes.

Here's a challenge: let's think about our pledges to the work we do as a community at Pilgrim Church like those speed limits. Let's make our pledges the bottom line for our giving. That means giving above and beyond our stated intentions for giving.

When we hear the word *stewardship* we usually think about dollars and budgets. Those things are important. It is important. His message is something our world needs to come to believe and trust to find a deeply meaningful life.

Kathy Fiscus, a member of Central Lutheran Church in Minneapolis, writes this about stewardship:

Stewardship is a matter of the heart. My stewardship practices are a response to the boundless love God first showed me. It means that I am grateful for all that God has generously entrusted to me. As a faithful steward and child of God, I understand that the decisions I make, in all aspects of my life, reveal my priorities. It is a privilege to share time, talents, and finances, to care for God's earth and to serve my neighbors. Being a good steward has brought me great joy and has helped me grow spiritually. I am blessed to be a blessing.

The gift of life, including the whole of this world, is a sign of God's trust in us to care for what belongs to God. Stewardship is about how we care for all that God has given us. When we serve our neighbors, sharing food or time or concern, when we gather to work on God's mission through the church, when we take the time to pray and to worship as a community, we are being stewards of God's gifts.

So please don't let your offering stop at the collection plate on Sunday mornings. We are called to be stewards seven days a week. That is stewardship in the biggest sense of the word.



Sunday Readings - February 2014

February 2 - Presentation of Our Lord

Malachi 3:1-4

The prophet proclaims a new beginning as God appears in the temple to call the people of God to a renewal of God's covenant with Israel.

Hebrews 2:14-18

The author to the Letter to the Hebrews emphasizes the humanity of Jesus because it is in Jesus' sharing our flesh that our salvation is secured.

Luke 2:22-40

Mary and Joseph fulfill the demand of the Law by presenting Jesus in the temple at Jerusalem. While there two prophets, Simeon and Anna, recognize Jesus as the one who God sent to bring about the redemption of Israel.

February 9 - Fifth Sunday after the Epiphany

Isaiah 58:1-12

Isaiah proclaims the blessings of obedience to God's will.

1 Corinthians 2:1-16

The message of God through Jesus Christ is both basic and down to earth and filled with wisdom for living. Discerning both the simplicity and depth of this message is Paul's mission for the Corinthians.

Matthew 5:13-20

In this section of the Sermon on the Mount Jesus uses the images of salt and light. He knows that if his people know who they are, then they will know what to do as his followers.

February 16 - Sixth Sunday after the Epiphany

Deuteronomy 30:15-20

As God's people enter the promised land, they are reminded that in daily life they have decisions to make about serving God. They can choose to walk in the way of life or the way of death. Nonetheless it is God who has made them the called people of God.

1 Corinthians 3:1-9

Quarreling and jealousy were rife among the Corinthians. Some thought of themselves as better or more spiritual people than others. Paul reminds them that what matters most is not who they are but that they are God's own people.

Matthew 5:21-37

Jesus intensifies the Law of God by speaking of the purpose of the Law: it is to reveal the sin that is in our lives. By his teaching Jesus reminds all of us that we need to have a savior. Our lives cannot produce the demands of the purpose of the Law of God.

February 23 - Seventh Sunday after the Epiphany

Leviticus 19:1-2, 9-18

God calls Moses to remind the people of the Exodus that they are holy because they belong to God. Then God lays out what it means to be holy: it means moving beyond selfishness to inclusion of others. 1 Corinthians 3:10–11, 16–23

The Good News of Jesus does not belong to one person; it is a team effort that allows the Gospel to be preached. Part of that team effort is in the hearers of the Gospel opening their hearts and minds to trust what the world might consider foolishness, but nonetheless is true because of who God is.

Matthew 5:38-48

This section of the Sermon on the Mount addresses love and hate. Jesus reminds his hearers that they are called not just to love their family and friends, but even to love those who would hurt them, their enemies. He does this because he knows that only by loving others can we be "perfect" or "complete" as God is.
