From Our Pastor

Dear Fellow Pilgrims:

I know the world rushes to Christmas. Just look at the stores, drive around your neighborhood at night, put on the radio. Christmas is everywhere, except at church.

While the church might be decorated for the holiday, we still have four Sundays of Advent, a time when people itch to sing Christmas carols at worship and wonder why the Christmas trees are not yet lit. While people want to rush to what is festive (Easter is another holy day that gets rushed), the church knows there is value in waiting, in being patient. And so we keep Advent as a time of quiet remembering and patient waiting for the good news of the Incarnation.

Actually Advent is a time rich in personalities and in meaning. Advent begins not just four weeks before Christmas but on the Sunday closest to the day of St. Andrew (November 30). Just as he was the first of Jesus' apostles called to ministry, so too he leads the church in its ministry of making real the truth of the good news of forgiveness and welcome we see in the birth of Jesus. Andrew is the brother of Simon Peter.

On December 6 we have what is called the "little Christmas," the day we remember St. Nicholas who died on December 6 in 343. In some traditions that is the day small gifts are given to church in honor of Nicholas, a bishop from Myra in modern day Turkey. Nicholas is considered the patron saint of sailors. merchants. archers. repentant thieves, children, brewers, pawnbrokers and students. In a gruesome tale, Nicholas was credited with restoring life to some children. Consequently he is the figure from whom the modern day Santa Claus evolved.

December 13 is dear to people of Swedish background. It is the day of St. Lucia. She served people with a crown of candles on her head so she could bring food to Christians in hiding in tombs in the darkness. She is remembered for her kindness and willingness to serve those in need.

We also meet John the Baptizer in our Sunday readings. Traditionally he is thought of as Jesus' cousin. His ministry was a call to repentance, to preparing for the coming of God's anointed one, Jesus. He challenges people to think about what is selfish in their lives. He calls us to consider how we can be more generous in our lives. We also meet his mother, Elizabeth, when the Virgin Mary goes to visit her during their mutual pregnancies.

Finally we encounter Mary, the mother of Jesus. She is the one God chose to give flesh to God's Word in the birth of Jesus. Mary was a simple girl, not one of power or attentiongetting attributes. But because of her humility and acceptance and trust in God, she becomes the means for salvation to come into the world, and, as Martin Luther often wrote, the example for us of what Christians should be, what the church should be.

So Advent is filled with saints who call us to consider our lives and how we prepare for the gift of grace that Christmas brings. I hope your Advent holds some time for quiet and reflection before we break forth in the joy of the birth of Christ.

By the way, remember this: while Christmas begins at sundown on December 24, it continues for twelve days until January 6, the Feast of the Epiphany.

I know, the church does things differently than the world, but it is a difference that enables us to remember that while we are in the world, we are not of the world. As followers of Jesus we walk a different path from others, one that brings life and healing into God's world.

Blessed Advent, joyous Christmas!

wedding anniversary or another special accomplishment. Envelopes are available in the narthex. If you have any questions about flower dedication, please contact Pat Frazier at 941-7656.


The Diane Fish Memorial Scholarship

The Altar Guild is assembling a committee to select a recipient of the 2018 Diane Fish Memorial Scholarship. We welcome your involvement as a committee member. The group is expected to meet less than four times this Spring before the end of May. The 2018 Scholarship application and information regarding the grant will be available in early winter with a May 1 due date; most colleges require students to make their decision of where to attend by May 1. Given higher education trends that impact students, the 2018 qualifications for this scholarship have changed. Pilgrim Lutheran Church men and women of any age may apply if enrolled full time in an accredited institution in the USA or abroad. This includes current high school seniors, former high school graduates anticipating freshman enrollment, and also upper class students currently enrolled in a college. Priority will be given to an applicant who has not received this scholarship in the past.
