From Our Pastor

Dear friends.

It is June 21, the longest day of the year, and I find myself being a little sad. I am surprised at how sad I find the loss of an "old friend." Today we had to have a huge oak tree in the middle of our back yard taken down. The tree was at least 100 years old, and it has always been a part of our yard for the 25 years we have lived at 283 Lippitt Avenue. Our kids had a swing in that tree, that tree provided shade for our family over the years. The tree was there as a part of our daughter's wedding reception held in our yard. There are many memories that this tree brings to me.

But I had always taken it for granted, that it would always be there, but a few years ago the gypsy moths chewed up much of its foliage and it did not survive. This summer it is completely bare and has no life in it, so it was time for it to come down. Basically it was not safe to have in our yard. Any branches that broke off would have been heavy enough to kill someone who would have been hit by them.

With the tree out of the yard there will be a whole different landscape. I know more sun will come into the yard and the moss that grows so well will not survive with the light. I also know that our house will be warmer in the summer and probably colder in the winter. Yes, things will be different, but this new landscape must come for the good of all. It's hard to lose an old friend, someone or even something, we assumed would always be there. You know what it is like, as do I, when we lose a loved one or when a friend moves away. Life is different, not necessarily worse, just different. We humans have a way of filling the losses life brings us with other blessings, and that is a part of how God created us. We are resilient and sometimes hopeful about the new that will come into our lives.

So Karin and I are talking about what we will put in the place of our old oak tree friend. I'm thinking a red maple, but that might be too different. Often it is a good thing to go out on a limb (no pun intended) to try something completely different and even out of the ordinary.

Facing life's changes is not always easy. There is something bittersweet about change, saying good bye and realizing the blessings that we had and knowing that something new is on its way can be exciting. With a tree it's relatively easy, with a loved one, a family member, a pet, a close friend, it is not so easy. I think Karin and I (and maybe even our kids and grandkids) will talk a few days or maybe even months before we make our decision about what will be in the place of our old oak tree.

I have pictures of the tree to help me remember it better and more realistically. I know they will help the memories continue about what a gift that old tree was for our family. Knowing our blessings and opening ourselves to the future is what life is about. None of us can do this alone, and we don't need to. There is always someone who will be ready to answer questions we have and give advice in how to proceed in making decisions. All any of us need to do is face the fact that we need someone else to be with us along the way.

Misusing the Bible



We heard it again in recent days how the Bible can be misused to justify something. This happens often when people pull


one sentence or even a few words from the Bible and use that piece as a truth that is supposed to be a solid biblical tenet. Cherrypicking Scripture is misusing the Bible. If the Bible were to be a book of rules, each unrelated to others, that kind of use might be justifiable, but it is not allowing the Bible to be a means for God addressing us.

While Paul does write in Romans 13 that government exists by God's institution, Paul does not see government as above God's purpose, but rather as one tool God uses to bring about God's will. Reading just a little further in Romans, Paul also writes: "Owe no one anything, except to love one another; for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law." And in another passage in the Book of Acts Peter declares this to the authorities of his day: "We must obey God rather than any human authority." (Acts 5:29).

One of the Reformers, John Calvin wrote, "The human heart is an idol factory." He knows, as did Jesus, how easy it is for us to find something else in which to put our trust and loyalty. I suspect we do this because it puts us in control of who or what is running our lives, and we like to be in control. But by claiming that we decide what will be our god, our idol, we are actually putting ourselves in control. To be honest, just as with Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden, eating that fruit of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, we make lousy gods.

When we look at Scripture in the biggest view possible, we see that the message of the Bible is that the final victory belongs to God and God has a heart of compassion, especially for those who struggle and suffer. God's people are called to never be the reason for the suffering of others. We are called to stand with those with little or no power, the person considered "the other" or even thought of as our enemies. Read Matthew 5:43. It's part of Jesus' Sermon on the Mount.

Communion Classes Continue




There are five students in our communion class this summer. The meetings will continue following the 9:30 services on July 1 and July 15. It's not too late to join. We meet in the parlor. Classes are
